Program Notes

O Magnum Mysterium

O Magnum Mysterium was commissioned by Marshall Rutter to honor his wife Terry Knowles. The world premiere took place on December 18, 1994 at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion in Los Angeles and was performed by the Los Angeles Master Chorale under the direction of Paul Salamunovich. O Magnum Mysterium depicts the birth of the new-born King among the lowly animals and shepherds. This setting honors the adoration of the Blessed Virgin and the peaceful inner joy at the birth of her son.

Latin

O magnum mysterium, et admirabile sacramentum ut animalia viderent Dominum natum, jacentum in praesepio! Beata Virgo, cujus viscera meruerunt portare Dominum Christum, Alleluia!

English

O great mystery, and wondrous sacrament, that animals should see the newborn Lord, lying in their manger! Blessed is the Virgin whose womb was worthy to bear the Lord Jesus Christ. Alleluia!

Russian Choral and Overture

Tchaikovsky's **Russian Choral and Overture** is based on traditional Russian folk melodies. The theme for the **Choral** is from Tchaikovsky's **Album for the Young**, where it is titled "In Church," and it demonstrates the modal harmonies and *tempo rubato* used in Russian choirs. The **Overture** begins with a strongly rhythmic folk tune ("At the Feast"), followed by a heart-felt melody ("Song of Endearment"), a traditional melody ("Along the Street") that begins slowly and increases in speed, and a pair of rugged dance tunes ("The Brave Gypsy" in a major mode and "The Wild Duck" in minor) that build in intensity to an exhilarating conclusion.

Homeland

Homeland, also entitled "Jupiter's Theme," from Gustav Holst's (1874-1934) **The Planets**, was sung at the wedding of Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer and, sadly, also at her funeral at the request of her sons. The text was written by Sir Cecil Spring-Rice (1859-1918), whose life was spent in the British diplomatic service. He served during World War I and knew what it meant to love and serve his land with unceasing sacrifice. The arranger of Homeland, Z. Randall Stroope, wrote the second and third stanzas in dedication to his father, who, as a prisoner of war, walked the Bataan Death March in World War II so that his son, and the sons and daughters of others, could celebrate freedom and life to this day.

O Fortuna

O Fortune

O Fortuna (O Fortune) is undoubtedly the most famous portion of Carl Orff's Carmina Burana (originally scored for symphony orchestra and chorus), and is recognized by millions of people all over the world. The movement is included at both the opening and closing of this great masterwork. In O Fortuna, Orff brilliantly captured the meaning and nature of the Wheel of Fortune, a medieval conceptualization of the capricious nature of Fate. As the movement opens with a pounding timpani and large chorus, the listener is introduced to the Wheel's magnitude. The haunting, foreboding text and melody that follow, sitting atop a river of endlessly repeating orchestral accompaniment, mimic the Wheel's constant rotation.

Sors immanis et inanis, rota tu volubilis. status malus. vana salus semper dissolubilis. obumbrata et velata michi quoque niteris: nunc per ludum dorsum nudum fero tui sceleris. Sors salutis et virtutis michi nunc contraria, est affectus et defectus semper in angaria. Hac in hora sine mora corde pulsum tangite; quod per sortem sternit fortem. mecum omnes plangite!

English

O Fortune, like the moon you are changeable, ever waxing and waning: hateful life first oppresses and then soothes as fancy takes it: poverty and power it melts them like ice. Fate-monstrous and empty. you whirling wheel. you are malevolent. well-being is vain and always fades to nothing, shadowed and veiled you plague me too: now through the game I bring my bare back to your villainy. Fate is against me in health and virtue, driven on and weighted down, always enslaved. So at this hour without delay pluck the vibrating strings: since Fate strikes down the strong man. everyone weep with me!
