NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

"Stop making stupid people famous." I was scrolling through nothing as usual on Facebook when I came upon a photograph of this phrase on a sandwich board outside a café. Perfect. A photograph that captures the internet effect, where fame is whatever the social media user wants it to be. Fame occurs for reasons as banal as "clicks" and "likes." Our brilliant scenic designer and new faculty member Professor Michael Ganio had seen the same image and brought it to our first design meeting. "Stop making stupid people famous" became our mantra for telling the story of murderesses in 1920s Chicago who achieved incredible fame after killing their lovers.

We decided that our production would focus on the impermanence of fame and its trappings while reminding our audiences that this tale of the 1920s is even more applicable today. When the play opens, we see Roxy Hart in a romantic embrace, but with a camera strapped to her bed! The law office of Billy Flynn is decorated with trophies won in celebrity cases: a deflated football, a pair of figure skates with a metal baton and a framed black leather glove. Perhaps most damning of all, *Razzle Dazzle* connects showbiz shenanigans with political shenanigans as we dance, circus-like, in a courtroom.

We hope our *Chicago* takes you on a new and exciting journey. It is an incredible musical with an unforgettable score and fascinating structure straight out of vaudeville. We in the Department of Theater are so proud of this immensely talented group of young artists and cannot wait for you to be wowed by their talent, charisma, and passion.

ABOUT THE CREATIVE TEAM

Carol Dunne (director) is the Artistic Director of Northern Stage, a professional regional theater in White River Junction, VT, and a Senior Lecturer at Dartmouth where she teaches acting and acting for musical theater. Previous directing credits at Dartmouth include Hairspray, Angels in America, Eurydice, Hair and The Rocky Horror Show. In 2010, she was awarded Dartmouth's Distinguished Lecturer Award. Dunne previously ran the New London Barn Playhouse, a beloved summer theater company, and offered over 70 Dartmouth students work in the professional theater during her tenure. As Artistic Director of Northern Stage, Dunne has successfully overseen a transformation of the company culminating in the opening of its new state of the art theater, the Barrette Center for the Arts. Northern Stage directing credits include the critically acclaimed productions of Our Town, Into the Woods, Good People and Songs for a New World. Dunne,

Northern Stage and the Dartmouth Department of Theater have created a strong relationship, featuring a collaborative Shakespeare in the Schools program which will bring residencies to middle schools across Vermont, and professional internships offerina Dartmouth students immersive experiences in the professional theater. Dunne was a company member of The Cleveland Play House and appeared at many regional theaters including the Great Lakes Theater Festival, She holds a BA from Princeton and an MFA in acting from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

Andy Roninson (music director) is thrilled to be back at Dartmouth after conducting Merrily We Roll Along in 2015. Based in New York City, Roninson has music-directed at the Public Theater. Playwrights Horizons and other Off-Broadway theaters as well as regional theaters such as Park Playhouse and the New London Barn Playhouse (with three NH Theatre Award nominations for Best Music Direction). As a composer, he is a member of the BMI Lehman Engel Workshop where he was the recipient of the Robert B. Sherman Scholarship and the Harrington Award for Creative Excellence. He is the founder and host of the ten-minute musical podcast, Take A Ten, which has won awards at festivals in New York City and has been produced at theaters, cabarets and schools around the world. Michael Ganio (set designer) joins the faculty at Dartmouth while in the middle of an ongoing professional career in the American performing arts. Chicago celebrates his inaugural collaboration with the staff and faculty at Dartmouth College. This spring he will be designing Rebecca Gilman's new play, Luna Gale, for Seattle Repertory Theatre. This will be followed by a production of Death of a Salesman at American Players Theatre with long-time collaborator Kenneth Albers. His work has been seen at The Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Portland Opera, Milwaukee Repertory Theater, Chicago Opera Theater, The Denver Center Theatre Company, and Virginia Opera, among other American performing arts companies.

Nicolle Allen '16 (costume designer) is very excited to be working with the incredible team behind Chicago. Previously she has designed costumes for several student productions such as: Baltimore Waltz (Fall 2015), Merrily We Roll Along (Spring 2015), Mud (Winter 2015) and Cabaret (Spring 2013). During her time at Dartmouth, she was presented with the George Schoenhut Award for Theater Service (2013) and the David Birney Award for Excellence in Theater Arts (2015). She is a theater major currently working on her honors thesis in the Theater Department, and plans on moving to New York to pursue a career in costume design after she graduates in June.

Laurie Churba (costume designer) recently designed What the Butler Saw at the Mark Taper Forum in LA and Our Town and Clybourne Park at Northern Stage. Churba worked extensively in New York City as a costume designer in theater, television and film for fifteen years and is currently the faculty costume designer and professor at Dartmouth College. Her costume designs have been seen in over 100 stage productions from

Dan Kotlowitz (*lighting & projection designer*) is the Leon E. Williams Professor of Theater. He received the John M. Manley Huntington Memorial Award for outstanding teaching and research, was a Petit Family Fellow and Melville Strauss Faculty Fellow, and has received grants

from Dartmouth's Neukom Institute for his work with projection design. He is currently Chair of the Theater Department. He has designed over 200 professional productions. His designs have been seen in New York at the Promenade Theatre, The Public, Playwrights Horizons, Manhattan Theatre Club, the Joyce Theater, Serious Fun! Festival at Lincoln Center, New Federal Theatre, Soho Rep, and AMAS Rep. He has designed in regional theaters all over the country including: Center Stage Baltimore, Hartford Stage, the Long Wharf, Huntington Theatre, Trinity Repertory, La Jolla Playhouse, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, Berkeley Repertory Theatre, Milwaukee Repertory Theater, Capitol Repertory, Merrimack Repertory Theatre, Virginia Stage Company, Shakespeare and Company, Berkshire Theatre Festival, Connecticut Repertory Theatre, Northern Stage, and the George Street Playhouse. His design work for performance artist Diamanda Galas has been seen nationally and internationally. He is, most importantly, the proud father of Isabel and Dylan.
